LEADER'S MESSAGE

Redbridge - my home, your home, united as one community

Dear neighbours,

As Leader of Redbridge Council, I am driven by one simple but powerful belief: this borough belongs to all of us, and our strength lies in the way we look out for one another. Redbridge is a place where different faiths, cultures and backgrounds don't just coexist – they enrich one another. That spirit of togetherness never feels more alive than during the festive season.

We are pressing ahead with major investment in leisure centres and sports facilities so that every child (and adult!) whatever their background, can swim, play and grow in confidence.

Most people take pride in our borough and follow the simple rules that keep it special. For the small minority who don't – whether that's fly-tipping, antisocial behaviour or neglecting shared spaces – we will continue fair but firm enforcement. Redbridge is our home and looking after it is a responsibility we all share.

As the New Year approaches, there is a lot to be optimistic about, so let's keep working together, building a borough that is fair, green, and full of opportunity for everyone. Together, we make Redbridge not just a place to live, but a place to belong.

Investing in local leisure and culture

Redbridge Council is delivering a series of improvement projects

Following the recent opening of Serenity Ilford - a new women's gym in Ilford offering a fitness studio, classes, weights, and a members' lounge - several other key investments are underway at well-loved and cherished venues across the Borough.

One of the borough's most significant investments is underway in **Wanstead**. The development will deliver new educational and leisure facilities, including an IT suite, specialist art studios, and a modern swimming pool safety system. Completion is expected by the end of **spring 2026**.

At Fullwell Cross leisure centre, a contractor is being appointed to carry out essential improvements to the swimming pool roof, with construction expected to start late spring 2026. The spa, reception, and studio spaces are fully operational, group exercise classes continue in Studio 1 and the Sam Ryan Studio and swimming sessions have been relocated to Loxford and Mayfield Leisure Centre.

At **Kenneth More Theatre**, plans to fully reopen this much-loved cultural venue by the end of

2026 are progressing, with a contractor set to be appointed in February 2026. While the auditorium is being upgraded, other parts of the building remain open for community use.

At South Woodford library and gym,

refurbishment work will begin in early 2026. In the meantime, services continue through a pop-up library and relocated gym at Redbridge Drama Centre, ensuring residents can still access key health and wellbeing services.

Despite being one of the lowest funded boroughs in London, Redbridge Council remains committed to investing in the borough's future, ensuring residents have access to high-quality spaces and services that support wellbeing, learning, and community life.

Helping keep Redbridge clean - together, and faster than ever

Redbridge Council is stepping up its commitment to cleaner, safer streets with the launch of a brand-new Rapid Response Clean Team. This exciting addition to our Street Cleansing service not only means that when residents report urgent issues - like offensive graffiti, fly-tips, spills, or street furniture that needs urgent cleaning - we'll be able to respond faster than ever, but it also introduces a proactive approach to keeping our streets clean.

At the heart of this new service is a specially equipped vehicle, operated throughout the day by two dedicated team members. The vehicle is designed to handle a wide range of street scene issues and will also be available for out-of-hours emergencies, ensuring Redbridge remains a clean

and welcoming place for everyone. As part of its proactive role, the team will be patrolling the borough to spot issues, supplementing all our existing cleaning services.

While we've always responded to urgent reports, it often meant pulling teams away from scheduled work. With this new setup, our regular cleansing operations can continue uninterrupted, while the Rapid Response vehicle tackles ad-hoc priorities and proactively resolves problems.

This is a practical, resident-focused improvement that reflects our ongoing investment in public spaces, and our pride in keeping the borough looking its best.

Zero Tolerance to Grime Crime!

Cracking down on flytips, untidy land and front gardens, and other grime crimes

Like you, we're appalled by the illegal fly-tipping and other grime crimes that pollute our beautiful borough. We've drawn a line in the sand with our Zero Tolerance campaign. Redbridge Neighbourhood Enforcement officers are working around the clock to identify and pursue those who are trying to bring Redbridge down. In the last 12 months, we have prosecuted 22 people for fly-tipping and the courts have issued fines totalling over £10,000. Our officers have also issued more than 430 fines at £1,000 each for illegal dumping.

Thanks to your reports, and the hard work of our officers, we are making a big difference.

Newbury Park

We've been taking targeted action working with local landowners in hot spots, including this bit of private land in Newbury Park that was becoming a local dumping ground for rubbish. After speaking with the owner, the land has now been secured and there have been no more fly-tips there since.

ZERO TOLERANCE

Redbridge seizes £50K of illegal vapes in just one week



Single-use vapes were banned earlier this year by the UK Government due to health risks and their appeal to children and teenagers

through sweet flavours and colourful packaging

Council officers seized 4,000 illegal vapes in just one week as part of a zero-tolerance crackdown. The haul, worth £50,000, came from just six shop inspections carried out by Trading Standards officers.

Businesses caught stocking and selling these illegal vapes face an unlimited fine, or a prison sentence of up to two years.

This latest operation signals Redbridge Council's commitment to a safer, vape-free borough, with fresh investment in Trading Standards to tackle harmful and illegal goods.

Councillor Khayer Chowdhury, **Cabinet Member for Enforcement and Community Safety, said,**

"I am expanding our Trading Standards team by recruiting new officers and the goal is to visit every vape shop in the borough. To those selling illegal and harmful single-use vapes to our children and young people, know this: We are coming, we will seize your goods, and we will prosecute you. Take this as notice that Redbridge will not stand for unsafe and illegal products being sold to young people."

"We will not allow illegal vapes to threaten the health of our young people. Redbridge is taking action, and we won't stop until every shop is playing by the rules. This crackdown shows we mean business."



The crackdown is backed by the launch of 'Say Something Save Someone', a new anonymous reporting tool for children and teenagers. Developed by London Trading Standards, young people can report concerns such as illegal sales or giveaways,

Protecting services while facing tough choices

Redbridge Council runs over **400** services

Council prepares for 2026/27 budget

Redbridge Council is preparing its budget for next year against one of the most challenging financial backdrops in decades. Rising demand for housing and social care, combined with historic underfunding, means the borough faces a significant budget gap in 2026. Last year alone, Redbridge spent £52 million on temporary accommodation. What was once an emergency measure has become routine, with nearly 3,000 households in temporary housing and 8,000 people on the waiting list.

Budget – we've been underfunded for years, and you deserve better.

Since 2010, Redbridge has lost over £160 million in annual funding, and fair funding has been promised for too long. Over the last year, we've been making the case for change – with the support of local MPs and by working together, we are hopeful. We've fought your corner for a long time, and now the door has opened with ministers and government advisors. Painstaking work is paying off, and we wait in hopeful anticipation for the Government's announcement in the coming days.



IMPOWER, an independent consultancy that works with councils across the country to improve efficiency and demonstrate value for money, confirmed that Redbridge is the most productive council in London, ranking number one for efficiency. This evidence has been crucial in showing Government that we are doing everything possible locally – and that fair funding is urgently needed.

Despite these pressures, the council has worked tirelessly to protect the services residents value most. Weekly bin collections, libraries, children's centres, and parks have all been maintained – and even improved – thanks to strong financial management and working innovatively.

Councillor Kam Rai, Leader of Redbridge Council, said,

"We've made the case to Government, including meetings at Number 10, and they are listening. We've fought hard to ensure our Borough gets its fair share. Without this lobbying, services like libraries and children's centres could have been at risk. We've kept them open and even opened new facilities, because we know how much they matter to you. There are tough times ahead but working with a Government that's listening, we can make Redbridge an even better place to live."

Councillor Vanisha Solanki, Deputy Leader of Redbridge Council, said,

"We're proud that Redbridge has been ranked number one in London for efficiency and productivity. But the reality is clear: without fairer funding, we cannot meet rising demand and protect essential services. That's why your views are vital. Please continue to complete our budget survey and tell us what matters most to you."

Although the council is hopeful of an improved financial settlement following the Government's Fair Funding Review, we will still pursue further financial support from the Government whilst improved funding kicks in, and as we always do, will continue to fight for Redbridge.

New service 'helps you become the best parent you can be'

Redbridge Council and the NHS have launched a new service to support vulnerable families, from pregnancy through to a baby's first birthday

The **Family Help: Pre/Post-Birth Service** aims to help parents build confidence and care for their children safely, reducing the number of babies taken into care. Officially launched by the Leader of the Council, Councillor Kam Rai, and Wes Streeting, the Labour MP for Ilford North, the service offers practical support and guidance during pregnancy and the early months of parenthood.

The service was officially launched at the Mini Explorers Centre in Ilford, with Ilford North MP Wes Streeting attending and giving a keynote speech. He praised the service as "joined-up, compassionate support" and said Redbridge was "leading the way."

A local mum who benefited from the service said, "The service has changed my life. I was struggling mentally, but with the support I received - help with caring for my baby, guidance to Citizens Advice, and support to overcome depression - I'm extremely grateful."

Future Leaders UK: Opening doors for local young people

Future Leaders UK is an award-winning organisation that began right here in Redbridge and is now transforming opportunities for thousands of young people locally and across the country



Founded by local teachers five years ago and backed by funding from Redbridge Council, Future Leaders UK was created to tackle a challenge common to many: while our schools achieve excellent results – consistently above the national average – grades alone don't guarantee access to top careers. Too often, talented young people lack the networks and confidence that

open doors to universities, apprenticeships, and professional pathways.

Future Leaders UK bridges that gap. Through a free, year-long programme, students aged 16 to 18 gain leadership skills, mentoring, and real-world experiences that build confidence and ambition. Participants attend workshops, university residentials, and work placements with leading employers, from the NHS to global firms. They visit places like Oxford and Cambridge, and even Downing Street, all experiences that broaden horizons and inspire big dreams.

Councillor Vanisha Solanki, Deputy Leader of Redbridge Council, said,

"When we first heard the idea about Future Leaders, it was a no-brainer that we needed to support it, and I've seen first-hand the impact it's having. By connecting young people with role models and opportunities, Future Leaders UK ensures that talent - not background - determines success. It's a scheme that was made in Redbridge and is creating a generation of leaders both locally and nationally."

Over 5,000 young people have already benefited, and the impact is clear: 95% set ambitious goals, 98% build stronger networks, and many secure top apprenticeships or university places.


















Redbridge lights up for Christmas!

Major investment continuing in road resurfacing and flood protection



We're protecting homes and improving travel by combining cutting-edge flood prevention technology with major road resurfacing works

Better roads mean better journeys, which is why our highways team have been hard at work to get through our annual road resurfacing programme at pace.

Over 70,000 square metres of roads have been completed already this year - equal to the distance from Ilford train station to Brentwood.

This work is ensuring key routes and neighbourhood streets used by schools, local businesses and essential services are repaired and improved.

The works are part of a ten-year investment plan to make roads smoother, safer, and more resilient for everyone, with the pavement resurfacing programme next on the list.






Advanced underground flood defence technology installed in Wanstead Village.

Below ground, new flood defence technology is also helping protect homes and businesses from heavy rainfall. Following success in Seven Kings, the Hydrorock system has now been installed in Hermon Hill and Wellesley Road, Wanstead Village. These underground blocks act like giant sponges, soaking up rainwater and slowly releasing it into the sewer system to prevent flooding.

Across the borough, Redbridge's flood prevention measures can now hold over 1.6 million litres of rainwater, roughly the same as 64,000 five-minute showers or 9,000 full wheelie bins. Without these defences, that water could flood roads, overwhelm sewers, and damage homes and businesses.





CALLING ALL LANDLORDS!

Selective Licensing Schemes

If you're a landlord or agent and you operate any rented property, you may need to apply for a property licence.

Redbridge Council has two selective licensing schemes in place. Selective Scheme 3 (2 wards) has been in operation since **1 November 2023** and applies to rented properties within Ilford Town and Valentines wards.


Selective Scheme 4 (15 wards) came into force on **Monday 8 April 2024**. The wards affected are: Aldborough, Barkingside, Chadwell, Churchfields, Clementswood, Cranbrook, Fairlop, Goodmayes, Hainault, Loxford, Mayfield, Newbury, Seven Kings, South Woodford and Wanstead Village. These schemes require landlords or agents of most private rented properties in these areas to apply for a selective property licence. To apply, visit

https://propertylicensing.redbridge.gov.uk/

If you already have a selective licence for a property in these wards and it is still in date, the licence will remain in force until the expiry date shown on the licence. These new schemes were introduced after a full public consultation and confirmation by the government, who were satisfied that these schemes will contribute to an improvement in general housing conditions in the areas, and that private rented housing in the designated area is experiencing high levels of deprivation, high levels of migration, and significant and persistent antisocial behaviour.

Failing to get a property licence can result in receiving a civil penalty of up to £30,000 or prosecution in Court, where the fine is **unlimited**. Additionally, not having a property licence may prevent you from evicting tenants using the 'section 21' process. Tenants may also be able to claim back up to 12 months' rent from you, via a Rent Repayment Order (RRO). The Council will normally publish any prosecutions, enforcement, or legal action in the press and update the Greater London Authority's (GLA) public Rogue Landlord and Agent Checker and government intelligence databases.

Additional HMO Licensing Scheme

Redbridge Council approved a new five-year Additional Licensing scheme for small Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMO) across the whole borough. Additional HMO property licensing is now a legal requirement, as of **Monday 18 September 2023 until 17 September 2028**.

This means that any property which is rented to three or four occupiers forming two or more households that share (or lack) a toilet, personal washing facilities or cooking facilities needs to have an HMO Licence.



This includes certain converted blocks of flats (known as Section 257 HMOs), but only where all accommodation units are privately rented, and the building and accommodation units are in the same ownership or control. This includes buildings within mixed use developments or above non-residential premises.

The introduction of this new HMO Licensing Scheme comes after a full public consultation. Overall, it was found that there are significant issues such as poor housing conditions, ineffective management, crime, and antisocial behaviour persisting within HMOs in the borough.

Judith is thriving in Redbridge after completing her course

Judith Guarte Lee moved from the Philippines to be with her husband, after they met through an online support group for people with cerebral palsy.

In the Philippines, Judith's disability affecting the left side of her body - limited her opportunities, and arriving in the UK was daunting, as she spoke very little English.

She took advantage of Redbridge Institute's Community Learning Programme called Keeping Up with The Children. This helps parents support their child's learning through adult education. It was here that her dream of working in childcare began.

Judith enrolled in an ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) course and later progressed to a Childcare course – taking confident steps toward a brighter future. "The skills and confidence I gained led me to volunteer at a Nursery and within weeks I was offered a permanent role and now work as a Childcare Practitioner.

"Learning has helped me overcome barriers I have faced my entire life. My English has improved and my self-worth soared, teaching me the importance of positivity.

"I've always wanted to work with children, especially after my son was born. I want to show him - if you put your heart and soul into something - good things can happen!

"I'm incredibly grateful to Redbridge Institute, who has inspired me to believe in myself and follow my dreams."

Once the festivities are over there are a number of ways to ensure real Christmas trees can be put to good use. Take a look at the services available in Redbridge to help you dispose of your real Christmas trees in a planet friendly way:

Local charity Haven House is collecting Christmas trees for recycling from Monday 5 January to the end of Wednesday 7 January. They just ask for a small donation towards their charity work. Collections must be pre-booked via their link.

Haven House is a Children's Hospice where children can be children, even in the face of adversity. Their facilities offer a range of activities, such as music therapy, play sessions, and fun days, that enable children and families to create precious memories.

Redbridge Council will also collect real Christmas trees to recycle

To ensure collection you must:

- Leave your tree at the boundary of your property by 6am on Monday 12 January
- Remove all decorations
- Ensure your tree is clearly visible

There is no fee for the service, and no booking is required.

Real trees will be collected anytime between Monday 12 January and Friday 23 January so please ensure your tree is placed at the boundary of your property by 6am on Monday 12th January to avoid missing collection.



You can also take your Christmas tree and other items to Chigwell Road Reuse and Recycling Centre, just remember to check opening hours over the festive period.

It takes a community to help keep Redbridge tidy

Meet Wendy Hill from our street cleansing team







Wendy Hill has been a valued member of the Street Cleansing team for over five years. She's a friendly and well-recognised face in the Seven Kings community, where she works hard to keep the Borough we call home clean and welcoming.

Wendy was a dental nurse for over 30 years and took on the frontline role after deciding to try her hand at something new. She hasn't looked back since!

"I really enjoy what I do and feel proud that I'm able to make a difference to how the neighbourhood looks. I've been covering the same patch for five years now, so I've got to know many of the locals, and have made some really good friends in the area. I feel really happy when I've completed a shift and the area looks nice and tidy", said Wendy.

From clearing litter on the street, and sweeping leaves off the road, to weeding and bagging up rubbish for the street cleansing trucks to pick up, Wendy is constantly on the go.

Speaking about her role, the grandmother of four said, "The majority of local people are brilliant at looking after their neighbourhood, but sadly there's a small number of people who still don't do the right thing and think it's okay to drop litter on the street. It's those people who need to step up and do their bit for the community."

The most common items of litter found on the floor are "leftover food – often from takeaways - drink cartons, cans and bottles", **said Wendy**.

She continued, "If everyone used the street bins for litter, and took home their cartons and bottles for recycling, it would make a big difference. This is our borough, this is our home

– it is not too much to ask for someone to keep litter off the streets. Don't wait for someone to do it – that much we can all do. It takes a whole community to keep a neighbourhood clean and tidy. I'm just one part of that."

The 56-year-old is a much-loved part of the community with local people, families and businesses regularly showing their appreciation for her role in the neighbourhood.

"There are so many lovely people and families in my area. It's one of the best bits of my job. People always stop to chat or say hi. I even have a regular van driver who will always toot as a thank you gesture when he drives by and sees me clearing up the litter", **said Wendy**.

Luca Pal, Store Manager for Lucky Food Store in Green Lane, said, "Wendy has been helping keep the store front clean for many years, and does a fantastic job. She is a lovely lady and always has a smile for people."

Imran Qureshi, who lives in Seven Kings, also heaped praise on Wendy saying,

"She's an absolutely brilliant person, and is always working so hard. She 100% makes a big difference to our area and we can't thank her enough."

Sue's House awarded King's award

Holistic cancer-support centre in Ilford recognised with the King's Award for Voluntary Service

Sue's House, an Ilford-based cancer and holistic help centre, has received the prestigious King's Award for Voluntary Service in recognition of its outstanding contribution to the community. The centre, located at 10 Dawlish Drive, has been offering free, complementary support since 1984.


Run almost entirely by volunteers, Sue's House provides a compassionate "safety-net" for people affected by cancer-including patients, survivors, family and friends.

Services include counselling, healing therapies, relaxation, dietary advice and other supportive therapies, all designed to complement (not replace) medical treatment.

The King's Award for Voluntary Service is the highest accolade for community-led groups in the UK - a fitting tribute to the dedication and generosity of Sue's House volunteers, whose selfless work has provided emotional, practical and holistic care for decades.

One of the nominations for the award came from Cllr Tanweer Khan, Mayfield ward councillor.

He said, "This recognition not only celebrates the thousands of hours given freely by volunteers but also shines a light on the vital role of non-medical, holistic support in improving the quality of life for those affected by cancer."



River Roding project update



The River Roding Project has taken a big step forward this autumn. We successfully diverted the river into its newly constructed channel on 11 September 2025, which is a big milestone for the team and brings us another step closer to better protecting 1,500 properties in Woodford and Ilford.

We reshaped the riverbanks downstream of the new control structure and carried out a fish rescue to ensure no wildlife was left behind in the old channel. We then placed an earth bund to stop water flowing through the old route, while another was removed at the upstream end of the new channel, allowing water to flow freely into the new wetland area.

This breakthrough means construction can now begin on the full earth embankment, which will cross the old channel and connect to the control structure.

Working together to keep people safe this winter



Redbridge Council and Single Homeless Project are helping local people experiencing homelessness access support, shelter and services to

end their rough sleeping

As temperatures drop, Redbridge Council and Single Homeless Project (SHP), the Council's commissioned outreach service, are stepping up joint efforts to support people sleeping rough in the borough. The Street Outreach Rough Sleeping Team (SORT) is out regularly, offering food, essentials, and helping people access day services like the Welcome Centre in Ilford.


"We're here 5 days a week with Rapid Response covering weekends," says Isis, an outreach worker. "We know who is out on the streets, but people often only accept help when they're ready. Often it takes months of gentle conversation to build the trust and confidence needed for someone to come inside. Sometimes even a simple hello is the first step."

The team, commissioned by Redbridge Council, works jointly to identify needs and refer people into accommodation when they agree to it. "We plan our routes with the Council, so they know what's happening on their doorstep," **Isis explains**. "They even join us for street counts and census shifts, which helps us keep track of everyone we're supporting."

Winter brings added challenges. When the Greater London Authority activates the Severe Weather Emergency Protocol (SWEP) during extreme weather, the team assess people's needs and prioritises them for emergency accommodation. "We know how hard it gets out there," says Isis, who works closely with the Welcome Centre to secure warm clothes like gloves and shoes.

Support is coordinated through CHAIN, a London-based platform that records who's been seen, what they need and where they've been sleeping. "It's not just admin," **Isis says**. "It helps make sure no one is missed, even if they're still not ready to accept help."

A trauma-informed, person-centred approach underpins everything. "We refer to those sleeping rough as people experiencing homelessness, not 'rough sleepers' - language matters," Isis adds. SHP also supports access to healthcare, mental health services and immigration advice. "We do joint outreach with our transitional practice nurse, help people access health checkups, and support those coming out of prison or fleeing domestic abuse."





Redbridge Council also extends thanks to the many local charities and volunteers who provide vital support. Soup kitchens across the borough offer warm meals and conversation, helping people maintain dignity and connection. The SEVA team is again running its winter rucksack appeal, preparing rucksacks filled with essential items and

small treats to hand out this December. Their generosity, along with that of other community groups, plays a crucial role in helping people stay safe while outreach teams continue the patient work of building trust and supporting individuals when they're ready for change.

A new chapter for Loxford Lane

Welcoming families into new homes in the heart of Redbridge

Redbridge Council is celebrating a major milestone with the completion of its largest council housing development in years. Located on Loxford Lane, the new site delivers 159 modern, energy-efficient homes for local residents, built in partnership with Lovell.

Families began moving in from November, and the development is already bringing new life to the area. Designed with comfort, sustainability and community in mind, the homes offer a fresh start for local people who need it most.

Each home has been built to a high standard, with energy-saving features like air source heat pumps to help reduce bills and cut carbon emissions. Electric vehicle charging points have also been installed across the site, supporting greener travel and helping future-proof the neighbourhood.



New voluntary sector hub to open at Janice Mews

Bringing new life to the heart of our community



Redbridge's Mental Health Support Team celebrates 5 years of supporting young minds

Early mental health support in schools and colleges has helped thousands of children and parents in Redbridge thrive



Since 2021, Redbridge's Mental Health Support Team (MHST) has been working closely with schools and colleges to support the emotional wellbeing of children and young people. Now celebrating five years, the team has become a vital part of the borough's education and health landscape.

MHST is made up of psychologists, social workers, therapists and wellbeing practitioners who offer early support for issues such as anxiety, low mood and behavioural challenges. The team currently works with around 40 schools and colleges across Redbridge – each assigned a dedicated Link Clinician and Education Mental Health Practitioner. Together, they deliver a wide range of support, including resilience workshops for students, trauma-informed training for staff and guided self-help sessions for parents and young people.



The team also hosts monthly Parents and Carers in Mind webinars, covering topics like anxiety, body image and social media, which hundreds of parents have rated highly. Their Break the Stigma campaign encourages open conversations about mental health across schools, homes and community spaces, including faith and cultural settings.

Park runs in Redbridge – Fun, friendly, and free weekly 5k runs open to all abilities at Valentines Park and Wanstead Flats. You can walk, jog, run, volunteer or cheer others on. Junior parkrun events are also available locally for children aged 4 –14.



New Hainault skatepark (opening spring 2026) – A brand-new skatepark is coming to Forest Road Recreation Ground, offering a fresh space for active fun and skill-building for residents of all ages.

Redbridge Youth Service

Jenny, Senior Manager for youth services in Redbridge said,

"Redbridge Youth Service works with young people aged 11 – 18 (or up to age 24 for those with special educational needs or disabilities - SEND). We work with young people across the Borough offering informal education, issues-based discussions and learning, as well as fun activities.

"We have two youth centres - one in Loxford and one in Hainault. We also run SEND specific sessions, Duke of Edinburgh's Award (all three levels), detached sessions in parks and sessions with care-experienced young people.

"Redbridge Youth Council gives young people the opportunity to have their voices heard on matters that are important to them."

Community Action Redbridge

Saeeda Bugtti, Youth Leadership Programme Manager, Community Action Redbridge said,

"At Community Action Redbridge, we are proud to be working in partnership with Child Friendly Redbridge to ensure children and young people's voices shape local priorities.

"Through the PANELS project, our Young Advisors have helped organise and run a world café-style workshop with 18 local stakeholders from statutory, voluntary, and NHS organisations, to explore how adults and young people can work together to improve health and wellbeing. They have also led online workshops and peer research with young people across the borough to understand what matters most to them, what good engagement with young people looks like, and how services can become more youth-friendly."

The Lab Gym



Friendship across the ages

Young scouts and older residents share stories, laughter and life lessons

A heartwarming new project in Redbridge, organised by the Public Health Team, is bringing young and old together through friendship, fun and shared experiences. Generations United has seen members of Ilford Muslim Society, 15th Ilford Scouts, aged 10 to 14, visiting residents of Oakfield Lodge care home over a 12 - week pilot. Each week, around 10 scouts join residents to swap stories, play games, and enjoy arts and crafts.

The project is all about connection. For the care home residents, it's a chance to spend time with young people, share memories and feel part of the wider community. For the scouts, it's an opportunity to build confidence, learn new skills and learn valuable life lessons from older generations – all while working towards their communication and volunteering badges.

Early feedback shows the visits are already making a real difference: residents are smiling more, feeling less isolated and forming meaningful bonds with the young visitors. The scouts, in turn, are enjoying the laughter, wisdom and stories shared by their older friends.

This is just the beginning. If the pilot is successful, the project will be rolled out to other care homes and scout groups across Redbridge, helping even more people come together and experience the magic of Generations United.

The Redbridge Review: 2025 in pictures

We provide over 400 services for communities in Redbridge. Here's a snapshot of some of our work this year.























- 1 No one likes fly-tipping, and neither do we. This year, we've prosecuted 22 people, and issued 430 fines at £1,000 each to those caught dumping waste in our borough.
- Over **600 local people** took part in this year's ever Redbridge Photography Awards. The competition will be back next year, so keep your eyes peeled on our social media channels!
- We've repaired more than 10,300 potholes across the borough this year, making journeys safer and smoother for everyone.
- 4 We are delivering on our promise of **600 new** council homes, and are delighted that families are collecting keys and moving in just in time for Christmas.
- **2,327 children** have enjoyed our Holiday Activities and Food programme – offering fun, friendship and healthy meals during school holidays.
- **6** Three community activity days have been held, with many more to come!
- 7 Our hard-working waste and recycling teams have emptied over 10 million recycling and waste bins this year.
- 8 Students across Redbridge achieved excellent results again. 70% of secondary schools rank in London's top half, and 35% of these are in the top quarter.
- 9 Our libraries welcomed over 1.3 million visitors and over 1.4 million books were borrowed, the most in London.
- 10 Over **10,000 children** enjoyed activities this year, from swimming and sports coaching sessions to theatre workshops, dance, and interactive library events through the popular Megamix programme.
- 11 Our Pre and Post Birth service launched, providing support to vulnerable families from pregnancy through to a baby's first birthday.
- 12 Nine of our parks were once again given a Green Flag award.



Stay warm this winter with a Warmer Homes Grant

Free or low-cost home improvements to help cut your energy bill

As the colder months approach, Redbridge residents could get help to make their homes warmer and more energy efficient.

The scheme offers free or low-cost improvements like loft and wall insulation, heating upgrades, solar panels, and even heat pumps. These upgrades can help keep your home cosy and reduce your energy bills.

If you qualify, a free home survey will be carried out to see what improvements are right for your property.

The Warmer Homes grant is funded by the UK government and delivered by the Mayor of London. It's part of a wider effort to help Londoners live in warmer, greener homes.


