LEADER'S MESSAGE



Dear residents,

A year ago, we had just started to hear about COVID-19, and its impact in other countries. Twelve months on, and we are all too familiar with the virus and living with the devastation it has caused.


The Prime Minister recently outlined the steps that will complete England's roadmap out of lockdown. I am pleased we now have a plan, but we are not out of the woods yet and we all must remain vigilant and adhere to COVID-19 rules to keep Redbridge safe. We're working closely with schools so they're made as safe as possible before opening more widely, with regular testing on offer for staff and students (for the full roadmap, please see page 13).

While protecting public health remains our priority, we are also looking ahead to our recovery, and our focus is very clearly on regrowth and regeneration.

Recently, we received news of an additional £500,000 from the Greater London Authority to support further regeneration in Ilford Town Centre. The money will be used to improve our public spaces, create a Cultural Quarter and encourage enterprise.

The funding comes alongisde the imminent arrival of covered food and drink market, Mercato Metropolitano Ilford, and SPACE art studios.

The proposed new Cultural Quarter will have a civic and community hub, new library, theatre and leisure facilities.

This is particularly important for our younger generation who I know have been hit hard by the pandemic. I am keen that we harness the young talent within our borough so that people who grow up in Redbridge can continue to live and work here if they want to. To make this vision a reality, we need quality, affordable housing, job opportunities and thriving, vibrant highstreets – which is why we're building 600 new council homes and working with local businesses to match local skills with local opportunities.

New woodland project lays down

roots in Seven Kings Park

Five thousand extra trees have been planted in Seven Kings Park as part of a project to create new woodland space in the borough.





The joint initiative between the council, its partner organisation Vision RCL, and the environmental charity, Trees for Cities, lay its roots down with a series of socially distanced planting days at the park.

Among the species of trees planted were Alder, Hornbeam, Walnut and Oak.

As the trees grow, they will create a vibrant outdoor space for people to enjoy, help clean the air, and create a natural environment to support habitats and food for urban wildlife.

The Seven Kings Woodlands project is funded by the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL).



One, two, tree, go! Make the most of your tree pit!

We had another great year for our Adopt a Tree Pit scheme with over 1,000 successful applications made this year.

The popular scheme gave residents, schools and local community groups the chance to help beautify their neighbourhood by adopting their very own tree pit to bring to bloom.

This year saw 1,300 tree pits adopted, beating last year's figure of 900 – and nearly every ward in the borough has taken part for 2021.

The fun and interactive scheme will help make the borough's streets more attractive, as well as support wildlife including bees and birds.

The Barron family, from South Woodford, successfully applied to re-adopt their tree pit from last year.

Speaking about their tree pit, mum Lucy said:

"We really enjoyed taking on a tree pit in our street last year. The children loved spending time clearing out the weeds, planting wildflower seeds and taking care of their tree pit. It was lovely seeing it come to bloom. We used it as an opportunity to learn about gardening.

"After a successful first year, we re-adopted the tree pit and can't wait for the start of spring to plant our wildflower seeds again. The tree pit adoption is such a great community project."

COMMUNITY SAFETY

Record breaking crime survey helps us to understand your concerns

Our community safety team launched the first residents' crime survey in November.

Huge thanks to everyone who contributed to this, we've had an overwhelming response with more that 2,300 residents sharing their views.

Thank you to everyone who also attended one of our 28 virtual crime engagement sessions, more 300 residents got involved. They reinforced to us that tackling domestic abuse needs to remain a priority for the council.

Because of such great resident engagement, we are pleased to announce the council is launching a Community Crime Commission (CCC). This will help us to focus our crime and safety priorities at a local level.

The CCC will have your neighbourhood at its heart. The CCC will have a board of community

leaders and experts whose responsibility it is to look at the priorities set out by our communities, and how the police, the council and other public services can improve their response to these issues and concerns.

Residents can support the CCC by volunteering to be part of a crime focus group. The group will look beyond crime and will provide an opportunity to get involved in a range of council initiatives. Some volunteers will have the opportunity to sit on the board. You will help to make official recommendations to the council and the Community Safety Partnership on how public services are run.


Examples of the type of work the CCC might recommend include:

- the launch of award-winning youth programmes such as Box Up Crime
- the recent introductions of the two Public Space Protection Orders (PSPO) in Ilford and surrounding wards.

In addition to the set-up of the CCC, the Street Watch programme will be launched this spring, where more than 80 volunteers will provide high-visibility patrols in their local area. This will help to speed up the reporting of anti-social behaviour and street care issues to the police and the council.

The CCC will build on residents' feedback and input, so they can develop best practices to improve safety across Redbridge.

Ilford Town Centre Regeneration

Plans to create an Ilford for All and make the town centre a modern, thriving East London hub took a further step forward last month with an extra £500,000 from the Greater London Authority (GLA).

The money will support our plans to create a Cultural Quarter, revitalising the town centre by bringing art and industry together to generate economic activity and creativity, support our artists and entrepreneurs, and revive retail.

Leader of Redbridge Council, Cllr Jas Athwal, said:

"We remain focused on breathing new life into our borough, making Ilford a modern London city and harnessing the opportunities provided by Crossrail. We owe it to present and future generations to make this happen so that we build back better as we recover from COVID-19. This is something we want to do with our residents and businesses, so community engagement will be a big part of how our plans develop."

The additional money follows an earlier grant of £1.8 million from the GLA and will be used to improve:

- landscaping of public spaces
- accessibility into and around Ilford through lighting
- creatively making use of empty spaces for pop-ups, like shops, children's play areas or spaces for community groups to use.



Ilford regeneration

Ilford Station Southern Entrance

New entrance to the London end of Platform One (Ilford Hill) – work now complete and plans to open soon.

Western Gateway

Plans to transform the arrival into Ilford with improved access, cycle lines and pedestrianised town squares, complemented by key infrastructure and much-needed housing.

Mercato Metropolitano

The timber frame for the outdoor market is being assembled and work will continue on site through spring and summer with plans to open in a COVID-19 safe way post lockdown.

Public realm

Repaying of the high street is due for completion in the summer making it cleaner and more attractive.





Leading street artist Ben Eine and fellow artist Dotmaster were commissioned by the council to transform the walls of Janice Mews, in Ilford. Using their bold and distinctive styles they aimed to capture the emotions of current challenges, including COVID-19.

Hainault Forest restoration starting soon



This year, restoration work at Hainault Forest is set to revitalise this beautiful green space.

The site will benefit from new visitor facilities and improved footpaths and signage, while the locally listed Foxburrow Barns will be restored with the addition of a new café, visitors' centre and venue hire facility.

Several craft workshops will be set up for artisans to work and sell their products, the farm will be re-focused on animals, and an exciting new play area will be created.

The project is funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, as well as The Mayor's Fund at the Greater London Authority and the council. We are also working closely with our partners, the Woodland Trust, to improve access and links across the forest to preserve and enhance this nationally key area of ancient woodland in London.

Old Mill Court opens its doors to new residents

26 new council homes at Old Mill Court in South Woodford were officially handed over to the council at the beginning of March by the building contractor.



This is one of the most significant projects in the borough, being the largest council development to date. It consists of 22 two-bed and four one-bed flats.

Many of the new occupants had previously been homeless and living in temporary accommodation.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Jas Athwal, said:

"Having a dry, warm and safe place to live is a basic human right and we are determined to make rough sleeping in Redbridge a thing of the past. We also need affordable homes that enable strong and diverse communities that contribute to the richness of our borough."

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THIS YEAR'S BUDGET

The impact of COVID-19 is something which will continue to be felt across our communities for some time to come, which is why our commitment to maintain and protect the services you want and need is more important than ever.

As the vaccination programme rolls out and the light at the end of the tunnel gets brighter, it is vital we maintain focus on delivering critical services and investing in our borough.

Despite ten years of austerity, continuing cuts to local government funding, and the financial pressures of COVID-19, our ambitions for Redbridge remain on track, including:

- a new leisure centre at Wanstead High School
- an ambitious expansion project to double the size of Fairlop Waters
- major highways and infrastructure improvements
- · new affordable housing
- five new Community Hubs and one Civic Hub in Ilford. These hubs will feature large libraries with additional services including GP surgeries and children's nurseries

This is a great achievement, given that across London alone there has been an average cut in local government funding of 63 per cent, and we are still waiting to hear how the government will make good on its promise to compensate councils for the loss of income and ongoing cost of supporting our communities through COVID-19.

It is the combination of government cuts and reduced funding that has led us to the reluctant no-choice option of increasing council tax by 4.99 per cent at such a difficult time.

The overall increase is made up of the maximum two per cent uplift in the general council element and a further three per cent rise in the ring-fenced adult social care precept.

The rise means owners of an average 'Band D' property will now pay an annual bill of £1,425.73 for Redbridge Council's services which is an increase of 19p a day.

We are a low-spend council that has been punching above its weight for some time, and that is where we want to stay. We've set a balanced budget for next year, without the use of reserves, and despite the pandemic, we've:

- · kept every local library
- maintained weekly bin collections
- won Green Flag status for nine Redbridge parks
- opened two new leisure centres in Loxford and Goodmayes
- received an 'outstanding' rating for children's services from Ofsted
- delivered 800 food parcels to our most vulnerable residents
- helped more than 180 rough sleepers off the streets of Redbridge
- set up a Wellbeing Service and made over 19,000 telephone calls to our most vulnerable residents

There remain challenging times ahead, but we are determined to go from strength to strength and make Redbridge a great place to live and work.

Cllr Kam Rai, the Deputy Leader of Redbridge Council and Cabinet Member for Finance, Leisure and Culture, said:

66 The COVID-19 pandemic has inevitably taken a significant toll on our financial situation, but despite this we still have a strong and enviable track record as a high-performing, low spend council.

Our residents will continue to see us invest in and protect vital children's and adult social care services, while keeping our streets clean, focusing on safety, investing in council homes and delivering better leisure centres and award winning parks for residents to enjoy.



Testing and updates in Redbridge

No Symptoms

Lateral Flow Device (LFD) testing, also known as rapid COVID-19 testing, is another way to help detect and fight COVID-19. One in three people who have coronavirus never show any symptoms, but that does not mean they are not infectious.

LFD testing is for residents and local workers who do not have any COVID-19 symptoms and cannot work from home. The tests are quick and convenient, delivering results in 30 minutes.

Symptoms

If you have the following symptoms you must **SELF-ISOLATE** for 10 days and get tested at one of our three permanent testing sites. You can leave your house to get a COVID-19 test. Symptoms include:

- a high temperature
- a new, continuous cough
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste.

To ensure we reach each milestone, the government has four tests that have to be met before we can move onto the next phase of reopening, these are:

- vaccine programme continues to go to plan
- vaccines are sufficiently reducing the number of people dying with COVID-19 or needing hospital treatment
- infection rates don't risk a surge in hospital admissions
- new variants don't change the risk of lifting restrictions.

The government will be assessing the data for each of these measures as we ease out of lockdown. If these measures are not met, we may not be able to move to the next step out of lockdown as planned.

Introducing your new wheelie bin

The rollout of the new wheelie bins has started, but don't worry if you haven't got yours yet – we're busy delivering bins up until the end of May. It's on its way!



What you will receive, if you haven't already got it:

- 1 Your new, free official Redbridge 180 litre, dark grey wheelie bin.
- 2 A leaflet explaining how to use your new bin and make the most of your weekly recycling services.
- A sticker to place on the underside of your new bin lid to remind you what goes in.

We have carried out a borough-wide assessment to check each property's suitability for storing a wheelie bin. If your property is not suitable for a bin, we will be providing you with free red sacks and instructions on how to use them from 1 March onwards.

What are the benefits of your new wheelie bin?

Keeping our staff safe. Your new bin also helps keep our staff safe while they're doing their job. Wheelie bins minimise the risks to our crew as the waste is contained in the bin so they won't have to handle ripped rubbish sacks and spilt waste. It also reduces the risk of sharp object injuries to our crew.

Keeps our streets cleaner by allowing residents to **store and contain rubbish securely**; helping to prevent animals from ripping sacks; reducing split sacks on collection days; reducing littering and clean-up costs.

Encourages residents to recycle more to maximise space in their wheelie bin and help us to achieve our 50 per cent recycling target.



Stops businesses taking advantage of household collections.

Businesses have a legal responsibility to ensure that all waste is stored, transported and disposed of without harming the environment. Businesses must pay to have their waste removed by a licensed waste operator. Business waste should not be collected as part of the household collections.



What you need to do

- start using your bin straight away. It replaces the existing rubbish sack collections. Please place your rubbish sacks in the new wheelie bin. You MUST make sure all your rubbish is contained within the bin we cannot empty any other bins or collect rubbish by the side of your bin
- your collections will remain the same as normal
- normally, we would need you to put your bin or red sacks and recycling out by 7am on your collection day. Instead, whilst we are under COVID-19 restrictions, we ask that you do this by 6am or the night before.

Privately owned wheelie bins

You can only use the Redbridge bin that we have provided. Other bins cannot be emptied. We want to be fair to all residents, so we want everyone to use the same size container. Also, our collection vehicles may not work properly or safely with other types of bins. We will also be offering a bin amnesty, giving residents the chance to have any unwanted wheelie bins disposed of free of charge. Look out for information tags on your privately owned bins.

Residents living in flats and shared houses

We are currently assessing flats and shared houses to establish the best way to collect your recycling and rubbish. We will be in touch once the assessment is complete to let you know what happens next.

Using your new bin

Only use your wheelie bin for things you can't recycle. These include drinks glasses, plastic bags, nappies, food pouches, drinks cartons, black bags, broken crockery, broken toys, crisp packets, polystyrene, Pyrex, pet waste, plastic pots, tubs and trays and food waste.

Please use your weekly recycling service as much as possible. This will help to reduce what you need to put in your wheelie bin so there is enough space for your rubbish.

Need a recycling box?

You can request as many as you need. Visit www.redbridge.gov.uk/ wheeliebin There is a £3.50 charge for delivery. Alternatively, you can collect recycling boxes free of charge from our Ley Street depot.

Need a larger or smaller bin?

We can provide a larger bin where there is a clear need and certain criteria are met, including families of five or more, or those with more than one child in nappies. Smaller 140 litre bins can also be requested.

To request a smaller or larger bin you will need to complete our online form. Your request will then be considered, and we will let you know our decision.

Full steam ahead with Community Hubs

More than 100 residents have taken part in online workshops to co-design Community Hubs in Gants Hill and Seven Kings – a council initiative to bring services closer to the community and meet local need.



The council's Community Hubs programme is working with residents to bring together different facilities across the borough to improve the quality of services for residents. Five hubs are planned, as well as a new civic centre in Ilford, that will bring together council services such as libraries, GP surgeries and

children's centres. This enables local people to come together and run their own activities. The other planned hubs will be in Hainault, Woodford and Wanstead

Feedback from those who took part in the online workshops showed 84 percent agreed that the co-design process improved the design or project brief, and 95 per cent felt they'd been given an opportunity to express their views.

Residents praised the co-design process for helping them gain new knowledge (86 per cent), 75 per cent said it enabled them to connect with new people in their area, and an impressive 94 per cent wished to stay involved in the process.







Court ruling orders Barkingside dwellings to be demolished

A Redbridge resident is celebrating winning a legal battle after a developer flouted planning laws by building a property too close to his house, blocking light to one side of his Newbury Park home.



Redbridge Council's Enforcement Team took the developer to court, and the Judge ruled that the entire property, consisting of two dwellings, must be demolished.

Sivasankar said: "The previous house was a very small bungalow, so when I saw this huge building being built in its place, I knew something was wrong straight away. I was suddenly using electric light in two of my rooms all day long because there was a complete lack of light.





"The developer kept reassuring me everything was correct, and they were following the planning permission guidelines. They had submitted inaccurate dimensions to acquire their planning permission. Naturally, I am pleased the issue has been resolved and that the building will be coming down."

In the court case on 5 January 2021, a planning inspector dismissed the developer's claim that a neighbour does not have the right to light. The inspector upheld the council's enforcement notice requiring the building to be demolished within nine months to allow the current tenants to find alternative accommodation.

Cllr Sheila Bain, Cabinet Member for Planning and Planning Enforcement, said: "Here is

a perfect example of what our planning enforcement team can achieve against rogue developers. I believe this is a landmark case for Redbridge Council and sends out a very strong message to other developers who do not follow the correct planning regulations".



We won't tolerate these offences

Our Planning Enforcement Team is not tolerating this behaviour and in 2020 we served 150 notices, compared to 122 from 2016-2019.



Fairlop Waters centre to launch new fleet of boats

We're delighted to announce the Fairlop Outdoor Activity Centre (FOAC) will reopen this summer for local user groups and school children, as COVID-19 restrictions start to ease.

Fairlop, like much of the borough, will grow in terms of population over the coming years and our plans to add 250 acres of green space at Fairlop and a much-improved leisure and water activities offer, with sailing at its heart, will support this growth. We are investing in a new fleet of boats to benefit visitors and school children.

We recently revealed plans are underway for an upgraded Fairlop Outdoor Activity Centre (FOAC) as part of the broader project to improve and redevelop Fairlop Waters.

Cllr Athwal said: "I want to make it clear despite concerns over the centre not opening due to COVID-19 restrictions, there was never any intention to permanently close this fantastic facility, which has been enjoyed by people in Redbridge and further afield for more than 40 years.

"It's important to remember that we had one of the highest infection rates in the country only a few months ago, meaning that we couldn't commit to a group open sports water offer this summer for obvious public health reasons. We've thankfully witnessed a significant reduction thanks to people in Redbridge following the rules and doing everything they can to get the rates down.





Following the reduction in COVID-19 cases locally and the government's recent announcement on easing restrictions, we're delighted to go full steam ahead with reopening the sailing centre with new boats and even more activities this summer."

Redbridge fly-tipping initiative cleans up at national awards

Keep Britain Tidy announced the borough's Neighbourhoods and Street scene Team as an award winner in the charity's Network Awards 2021, held online on Wednesday 3 February.

Our team were thrilled to discover they had beaten competition from around the country to win the coveted Outstanding Service Delivery award, which recognised their successful work tackling a rise in fly-tipping across the borough between March and June 2020 – when the first wave of the pandemic hit.



The Association for Public Service Excellence (APSE) also shortlisted us as finalists in their national award ceremonies.

The APSE Service Awards shortlisting saw our Street Cleansing Team nominated for 'Best Service Team' for their work in transforming street cleansing services in the borough.

Not to be outdone, our Community Engagement Team was also shortlisted as finalists by APSE for the 'Best Community & Neighbourhood Initiative' award for their community engagement project – Redbridge Growing Together.

The project focused on working with residents on a range of environmental initiatives.

Redbridge leads the charge on greener travel with new fleet of electric vehicles

We started 2021 with a new fleet of electric vehicles and are encouraging residents and businesses to also consider greener modes of transport to tackle air pollution and help reduce the borough's carbon footprint.









The 12 new electric vehicles will be charged by the newly created rapid electric vehicle charging bays at the council's Ley Street depot.

And we're not stopping there! As part of our plans for more electric vehicle charging points, we're also creating an ultra-fast charging hub at the depot specifically for local businesses.

The hub will support businesses to use cleaner vehicles and will include at least two fast charging points which fully charge electric vehicles in under an hour.

Both initiatives are part of a range of environmental and air quality improvement schemes resulting from our successful bid to form a Business Low Emission Neighbourhood (BLEN) in and around Ley Street in Ilford.

The Redbridge BLEN initiatives will be delivered over a two-year period, and have been funded by the council, the Mayor of London's Air Quality Fund and EON.
