

Welcome to the Winter edition of Redbridge Life

Dear neighbour,

As the year comes to a close, now is a good time for reflection, for gratitude, and for looking ahead.

2023 has been a busy year in Redbridge. We've put together plans for our new Valentines Park lido (P.4), completed the Hainault Forest restoration project (P.14), and supported thousands of local people through the cost of living crisis (P.12).

As a borough, we've come together to celebrate the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III, the 120th year of our outstanding Redbridge Institute of Adult Education, and the opening of a world-class university medical school campus in Ilford.

As a council, we've delivered almost 100 homes for local families, supported the creation of a Community Grocery Store, and opened a brand new Engagement Hub – bringing vital services into the communities that need them most (P.20).

We've also worked closely with partners in the Police to keep our streets safe. Redbridge Council bringing Police Hub to Woodford

Redbridge Council, in partnership with the Metropolitan Police, is delivering a ground-breaking new Police Hub in Woodford, bringing Police back into local communities.



The new Woodford Police Hub will be home to at least 20 Police Officers working in partnership with council staff and Redbridge Housing Officers to prevent antisocial behaviour and support local people across the west of Redbridge.

Police Safer Neighbourhood Teams from Wanstead Park, Wanstead Village, South Woodford, Churchfields, Bridge, and Monkhams will call the new Police Hub home, bringing them closer to their neighbourhoods and cutting down on travel time.

The new Police Hub will sit on the Orchard Estate in Woodford, within 10 minutes travel time of South Woodford, Wanstead, and Monkhams.



Cllr Kam Rai, Deputy Leader of Redbridge Council, said

"Community policing keeps our streets safe, provides reassurance and empowers local people to develop good relationships with our Police Officers.

"As a council, we're innovating to deliver more for Redbridge. By working with partners in the Police and using council-owned spaces, like the offices in the Orchard Estate, we are bringing Police back into the communities they serve."

Local lido plans receive overwhelming public support

Plans for Valentines lido move onto next stage after completed consultations.

More than 1,000 local people responded to Redbridge Council's proposals to build a new lido in Valentines Park, as part of an online and in-person consultation, and over 29,000 people visited the Let's Talk Redbridge engagement website to find out more about the scheme.

The Council ran several in-person events at Redbridge Central Library, as well as an online survey asking for local views on the proposed plans. Following feedback from local people, stakeholders and partners, Redbridge Council has drawn up further designs and the official planning application process for the lido is now underway.

Urgent funding needed for Broadmead Road Bridge

Redbridge Council has written to the Government to seek urgent financial support to reopen Broadmead Road Bridge.

Join our campaign for vital funding to repair and reopen this critical transport link.

A major section of Broadmead Road in Woodford was closed to traffic in July 2023 due to significant structural defects reported following an inspection of the bridge. The road was immediately closed to prevent potential loss of life or serious injury.

Built in 1937, the bridge has served the area for almost a century and has reached the end of its life.

Broadmead Road will require extensive construction work and is expected to take

a significant amount of time. Essential repairs to the bridge are expected to cost around £25 million, but could cost far more.

Having lost around 63 per cent of government funding since 2010, councils across the country are in an incredibly difficult financial position.

In Redbridge, the impact of government funding cuts and extra demand means we have around £230 million less to spend on public services every year. As a result, funding projects of this magnitude is not feasible within our budget. The Government must provide financial support to resolve the bridge defects and reopen this vital route in our borough.

In the meantime, structural engineers are conducting further surveys on the spans and legs of the bridge to establish the extent of the disrepair.

- The official diversionary route remains via the A406 to Chigwell Road or High Road, Woodford.
- We are monitoring roadworks in the Redbridge network area and reviewing future roadworks planned by utility companies.
- The bridge is open for pedestrian use.

Christmas recycling

Don't forget to use our recycling services for Christmas cards, cardboard boxes, paper wrapping (no glitter or foil wrap please) and more.



Worried you might have too much recycling? Our crews will happily take any extra recycling you have, and if you don't have enough recycling boxes, just place additional recycling in clear bags or cardboard boxes and leave it for collection as normal.

Christmas tree collection

Once the festivities are over, we'll collect real Christmas trees, for free, to recycle. To ensure collection, you must:

- Leave your tree at the boundary of your property by 6am on Monday 8 January.
- Remove all decorations.
- Ensure your tree is clearly visible.

We'll be collecting your tree anytime between 8 and 19 January, so please ensure your tree is placed at the boundary of your property by 6am on Monday 8 January to avoid missing collection. You do not need to book a council tree collection in advance.

Alternatively, you can take your Christmas tree and other items to Chigwell Road Reuse and Recycling Centre. Please just remember to check opening hours over the festive period, by visiting



Help spruce up your street

- adopt a tree pit today





Free wildflower seeds are available to help bring your street into bloom.

Redbridge's much loved 'Adopt a Tree Pit' is back, and for the first time, communities can team up to 'adopt' a whole street of tree pits to make their neighbourhood a 'Pollinator Pathway' for bees, birds, and other wildlife.

A Pollinator Pathway is a corridor of pesticide-free plants that connects different areas of habitat, encouraging pollinators such as bees to travel between them to access the food and shelter that they need.

By adopting a tree pit – or a whole street of tree pits under the Pollinator Pathway scheme – and planting wildflower seeds, you can create your very own mini garden on your doorstep and help local wildlife thrive.

Meet Redbridge's youngest litter picking hero

Three-year-old Tiago is keeping his neighbourhood tidy.



A local three-year-old, fed up with seeing people drop litter on the floor, has been helping clean up his neighbourhood and is hoping his actions inspire others to help keep the borough tidy.

Tiago Piccaro became the borough's youngest ever litter picker after noticing rubbish people had dropped in parks and on the street when out walking with his mum, Elisa.

"I've always made a point of telling Tiago it's wrong to throw your rubbish on the floor, but whenever we were out, he'd spot litter and would highlight the bad behaviour he was seeing around him" said Elisa.

Wanting to encourage Tiago's willingness to look after his local area, Elisa contacted the Council's neighbourhood team to borrow litter pickers.

Elisa continued "When I showed Tiago the Council litter pickers and explained what they do, he couldn't wait to start using them. He loved the idea of going out litter picking."

Speaking his mind about people littering, Tiago said "It's not very nice to throw things on the floor and make it messy. You must put rubbish in the bin."

The South Woodford duo went out weekly for several months, collecting a total of nearly 30 large bin bags worth of recyclable litter.

Among the rubbish, they found discarded were plastic drink bottles, glass beer bottles, tissue, food wrappers and containers, along with what Elisa described as "staggering amounts of single-use plastic waste".

Speaking about people taking ownership of their neighbourhoods, Elisa said "If a child as young as Tiago can care about where he lives, we should all be able to. I hope his passion for keeping his neighbourhood clean and tidy inspires others. As a community, we all have a responsibility to



look after the area we live in. It's our home. There are bins all over the place in the borough, and if you aren't near one, it's not hard to just take your rubbish home with you. When it comes to littering, the issue isn't there aren't enough street cleaners, or the Council isn't doing enough – the problem is the people dropping the litter in the first place. We need to hold ourselves accountable first."

Redbridge trials new, fast, low carbon fix for potholes





An innovative machine that can fix potholes in as little as two minutes was trialled by Redbridge Council recently to give road users a smoother journey.

The first of its kind to be deployed in the borough, the Injection Patcher carried out rapid pothole repairs using a pioneering technique known as Injection Spray Patching.

Not only is the process faster, enabling more pothole repairs in a day compared with conventional methods, it's also greener as there is no excavation, waste or heat involved – leaving a significantly lower carbon footprint on the borough.

On roads where the Injection Patcher was identified as suitable for use, the repairs were completed in just three steps, beginning with air pumped at speed into the pothole to remove dirt and debris.

Seconds later, the pothole was sprayed and coated with cold bitumen to cover and seal any cracks, followed by a final layer of aggregate applied at high speed – the whole repair taking just a couple of minutes to finish.

In a further boost for the borough's roads, the rapid repairs were carried out with minimal traffic disruption, often not even requiring road closures, with pothole fixes ready to be driven over almost immediately following repair.

The Injection Patcher machine, made by road repair specialists Velocity, notched up some impressive results with a record breaking 120 repairs in one day, and nearly 2,200 pothole repairs during the 12-week trial.

The trial worked alongside the Council's resurfacing programme and traditional pothole repairs being undertaken across the borough.

REDBRIDGE REWIND

Exploring the Rich History of our Borough

A history of charity at Christmas in Redbridge.

Our borough gets into the festive spirit each year with celebrations across Redbridge, including Christmas tree light switch on events and visits to Santa's grotto. As well as celebrating, our local communities come together to support one another and give to those in need.

In recent years, local groups and the Mayor of Redbridge have organised charity drives for Redbridge Food Bank and the Salvation Army Christmas Present Appeal, but our borough has a long history of giving over Christmas.

Walter Stevens first started the Santa Claus Christmas Distribution Fund in 1894 while living in Stoke Newington. The fund asked for donations of toys, money, clothing, and food to be donated for poor and underprivileged children. Donations were delivered in parcels and distributed on Christmas Eve. In it's first year, 310 parcels were delivered, rising to 1,710 parcels the following year. Children would wake up to toys including dolls, skipping ropes, skittles, tin trumpets,

marbles, and slate pencils on Christmas morning. In 1900, Stevens moved to Balfour Road in Ilford and that year, the Fund delivered 2,951 parcels on Christmas Eve to children across London.

By 1905, the Fund had expanded so much that Stevens' new house in Seven Kings was full to the brim with parcels. A hall was built in Durban Road, minutes away from Stevens' house, to store the growing numbers of donated presents. Stevens later became a Councillor, serving Seven Kings ward from 1912 to 1926.



Stevens held annual bazaars for the Fund at Ilford Town Hall. Items from the bazaars can be viewed at The Redbridge Museum.





The Fund continued to grow every year and even received donations from The Royal Family, with Her Majesty Queen Alexandra donating in 1905, and Her Majesty Queen Mary donating in 1913.

By 1912, the Fund was delivering over 10,000 parcels across London.



After the outbreak of the First World War in 1914, donations dropped significantly. By Christmas 1917, just over 2,000 parcels were delivered. Unfortunately, it is not known if the Fund continued following the war. However, we do know that Walter Stevens continued his charitable work, helping to create the Committee of the War Memorial Fund. Stevens died in 1938 in King George Hospital. A section of the hospital bears his name and is part of the War Memorial Gardens.

CALLING ALL LANDLORDS!

Selective Licensing Scheme

Redbridge Council approved a new five-year selective property licensing scheme in the **Ilford Town and Valentines ward** areas, known as Scheme 3. This is a legal requirement from the **1 November 2023 to 31 October 2028.**

If you already have a selective licence for a property in these wards and it is still in date, it will remain in force until the expiry date printed on the licence.

The introduction of this new scheme comes after a full consultation. Overall, it was found that there are significant issues with poor housing conditions and anti-social behaviour persisting within private rented properties in the borough, which the licences have been brought in to address.

Those who do not get the correct property licence could receive a civil penalty of up to £30,000 or could be prosecuted in Court, where the fine is UNLIMITED. Not having a licence may prevent you from evicting tenants using the 'Section 21' process, and the tenant may be able to claim back up to 12 months' rent via a rent repayment order. The Council will normally seek to publish any prosecutions, enforcement, or legal action in the press and within publicly accessible government intelligence databases. It may also result in an order banning a person or company from operating as a landlord or agent.

Additional HMO Licensing Scheme

Redbridge Council approved a new five-year Additional Licensing scheme for small houses in multiple occupation (HMO) across the whole borough. Additional HMO property licensing is now a legal requirement. The regulation came in on 18 September 2023, and will remain until 17 September 2028.



This means that any property which is rented to three or four occupiers, forming two or more households that share (or lack) a toilet, personal washing facilities or cooking facilities, needs to have an HMO licence.

This includes certain converted blocks of flats (known as Section 257 HMOs), but only where all accommodation units are privately rented, and the building and accommodation units are in the same ownership or control. This includes buildings within mixed use developments or above non-residential premises.

The introduction of this new HMO licensing scheme comes after a full public consultation. It was found that there are significant issues such as poor housing conditions, ineffective management, crime, and anti-social behaviour persisting within HMOs in the borough, which the licensing scheme will address.

Did you know... we have helped create 27 play streets in Redbridge?

Play streets are closed to cars for a few hours a month, enabling neighbours, children and families to play together.

Rayla Begum, East Play Street Lead, says "It was heart-warming to see neighbours who had lived on the street for decades coming out and talking to each other, as well as newcomers. I have high hopes for the beautiful, amazing relationships these play streets will create, and I'm looking forward to the many more positive community projects it will lead to".

Did you know... we have helped more than 1,800 households with the cost of living this year?

Georgina Ritson, Project Administrator, said "Someone came to us for financial advice, because they had no washing machine, we identified that a significant portion of their money was being spent at the laundrette, which then impacted the food they could buy. I was so pleased to be able to show them how they could get a contribution towards the cost of a washing machine and a cooker, and now, using the Community Grocery store in Ilford, they can cook cheaper nutritious meals at home."

Did you know... we have helped deter children from criminal gangs to keep them safe?

Our child protection teams have used virtual reality films as a tool to start conversations about exploitation, and how certain behaviour can place children at risk of being exploited. This approach will help them recognise the signs in the future and protect themselves.

Samuel, 17, said "Watching this film, I can see the risks involved and it is not as glamorous as I thought. I feel sorry for the character... one thing led to another and before he knew it, he was in a county lines trap house."



Street Cleansing

Ben, from the Street Cleansing team, said "It has always been rewarding to see the difference our work makes to the streets. From pavement washing to graffiti removal, it's all part of our role to help keep the streets looking neat and tidy."

Hainault Forest restoration project complete

Partnership working delivers £7m restoration.

This autumn saw the official completion of the award-winning Hainault Forest restoration project. which Redbridge Council delivered in partnership with Vision RCL, the National Lottery Heritage Fund, the Mayor's Fund at the Greater London Authority and the Garfield Weston Foundation.

To preserve the forest for future generations, Redbridge Council teamed up with partners to deliver a £7 million restoration project, which included a complete renovation of the Victorian barns, and the creation of a new visitor hub, with an event space, a café, artist workshops and a Woodland Trust visitor centre.

A new woodland-inspired children's playground was also created, complete with Redbridge's biggest slide. Our beloved Foxburrows Farm benefitted from new paths, barns and animal habitats for a family of Shetland ponies, alpacas, geese and rabbits who joined the existing farm animals.

"Historic Hainault Forest is much loved by communities across our borough, which is why we've invested, alongside our partners, to restore the Victorian barns, improve the landscaping and create a perfect family day out in the heart of Hainault.'

National Cricket Board stumps up £800,000 to improve cricket in Redbridge

Cricket in Redbridge will get a massive boost due to £800,000 funding to improve playing facilities in the borough.

The England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) provided the funding to help ensure the sport becomes accessible and inclusive to everyone in Redbridge. The borough is a real hotbed of cricket, with an estimated 7,000 people, including men, women and children, playing the game.

We're also fortunate to have some homegrown players from Redbridge who have played professionally. A prime example is Nasser Hussain, who lived in Ilford and went on to captain England between 1999 and 2003. It was in our borough where Nasser honed his cricket skills.

A large portion of the investment will go towards helping improve cricket pitches in our parks. We have installed seven non-turf pitches in locations across the borough, and work will take place over three years to improve the quality of cricket pitches. The funding will also extend to providing new sprinkler systems to pitches and installing hybrid pitches.

Cllr Kam Rai, Deputy Leader of Redbridge Council, said

"Cricket has always been a popular sport in our borough, and you can see how much people enjoy playing the game when you visit one of our amazing parks at the weekend or throughout the summer.

"We're thankful to the ECB for this funding that will deliver massive improvements to facilities across the borough. We also hope it encourages the next generation of cricket players to participate. Who knows, we may have a future Nasser Hussain, Joe Root or Nat Sciver-Brunt in our midst."

Have you had your flu and Covid-19 vaccines? It's not too late.



We all want to stay well throughout the winter, so make sure your vaccinations are up to date.

During winter, Covid-19 and the flu circulate as we spend more time indoors. The NHS is offering free Covid-19 and flu vaccines to eligible people this winter.

Your GP will have been in touch if you are eligible for these vaccines for free, but do get in touch with your GP if you:

- Are aged 65 or over (including those who will be 65 by 31 March 2024)
- Have certain health conditions or a learning disability
- Are pregnant
- Live with someone who has a weakened immune system
- Are a carer
- Are a frontline health or social care worker
- Live in a care home

If you are not eligible for a free flu vaccine you can book a jab at your local pharmacy for around £20.

Most children can have the children's flu vaccine, usually given via a nasal spray. This includes children who were aged 2 or 3 years on 31 August 2023, school-aged children (Reception to Year 11), and children with certain health conditions. Parents of school-aged children will have had an offer of their children having the flu vaccine at school.

Cllr Mark Santos, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care and Health, said

"Vaccinations are our best protection against the flu and Covid-19. For some people, particularly those over 65 and those with pre-existing conditions, there is a higher risk of developing serious illnesses such as bronchitis or pneumonia after contracting the flu or Covid-19. This can be life-threatening, and getting the flu and Covid-19 at the same time can be particularly dangerous.

"Make sure you get your vaccinations to stay safe and well this winter."

Domestic abuse can involve physical violence like hitting, or strangling, but coercive and controlling behaviours are also forms of domestic abuse.

If someone is trying to make you feel inferior, isolate you from friends, family, or other support networks, or take away your independence by stopping you working or controlling your finances, this is domestic abuse.

Coercive behaviour involves a pattern of threatening, humiliating, or intimidating someone, to exert control in a relationship. The perpetrator may use a number of tactics to control every aspect of the victim's life. This is domestic abuse.

Abuse can affect a survivor's physical, emotional, psychological, social, sexual and financial health and well-being.

Signs of coercive control:

- Taking control over aspects of your everyday life, such as where you can go, who you can see, what you can wear and when you can sleep.
- **Depriving you of basic needs**, such as food, water, and heat.
- Criticism and verbal abuse, such as shouting, mocking, name-calling.
- **Disrespecting and humiliating you**, such as putting you down in front of others; telling you are worthless and a bad parent.
- Controlling your finances, such as taking money from your purse without asking, giving you allowance, demanding receipts.
- Isolating you from friends and family, such as monitoring your phone calls and use of social media.
- **Depriving you access to support services**, such as medical services.
- **Using pressure-tactics**, such as threatening to withhold money, disconnecting the phone and internet, taking away or destroying your mobile, tablet or laptop, taking the car away, taking the children away, threatening to report you to the Police, social services or the mental health team, threatening or attempting self-harm and suicide, withholding or pressuring you to use drugs or other substances, lying to your friends and family about you, telling you that you have no choice in any decisions.

Help keep your home safe by following these helpful tips:

- Always lock (or double lock) your doors and windows before leaving the house and before going to bed.
- Dispose of all present boxes and packaging carefully.
- In the evening leave a light or TV on before leaving home so it looks like someone is inside.
- Set your burglar alarm, and invest in a smart doorbell.
- Burglars can hide behind tall hedges, allowing them to reach your home unseen by others, so keep them trimmed low if you can.
- Install security lights around your house to prevent dark spots.

Neighbourhood Policing in Woodford

We caught up with Daniel Green, who leads the Safer Neighbourhood Teams in Woodford.

Sergeant Green loves the strong sense of community in Woodford, as he explains

"It's always nice to attend our local community events; they are well attended. You certainly get a strong sense of community spirit in Woodford. It has been nice to meet people at some of our local events, such as Cuppa with a Copper and Street Briefings."

Like most areas, Woodford does have its issues with crime. Motor vehicle theft is one of the main things that keeps Daniel and his colleagues busy, "We tend to find that a lot of stolen vehicles end up in Woodford. Quite often, they are stolen from somewhere else in the borough and left for about a week to see if there's any tracking capabilities on the vehicle. The thieves then return to the location to see if the vehicle has been moved. We've made good progress by working with National Crime Agency colleagues to identify prolific offenders and conducting motor-vehicle operations locally."

Police Officers always have a good story to tell, particularly when asked about the strangest thing they have encountered. Daniel doesn't disappoint, "We had one afternoon where a flock of geese landed in Woodford High Road, which caused a bit of traffic chaos. We managed to herd them somehow and move them on."

Daniel smiles when he says, "It's all in a day's work."

New Engagement Hub opens in Ilford

The Ilford Lane Hub will provide council services to people right in the heart of our community.

ENGAGEMENT HUB







Redbridge Council recently set up shop in the heart of one of our busiest high streets and most deprived areas, where we will provide struggling local people with a range of council services, including cost of living support and access to local Police.

The new Ilford Engagement Hub is part of our groundbreaking approach to decentralising local government, providing vital services right in the centre of communities that need them most.

The Ilford Engagement Hub will be joined by Engagement Hubs in Hainault and Chadwell, bringing vital council services directly into three of the most deprived areas of Redbridge.

The new Ilford Engagement Hub opened on Ilford Lane in November. Through the Hub, people can access Anti-Poverty team sessions, Redbridge Parents and Families Information, Support Services for children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), and Metropolitan Police Safer Neighbourhoods teams. Our local ward councillors will also host regular surgeries in the Engagement Hubs.

With the cost of living crisis, the new Engagement Hub comes at a crucial time when people need access to council services more than ever.

The Leader of Redbridge Council, Cllr Jas Athwal, said

"Local people are struggling with the rising cost of living and so, despite government budget cuts, councils are having to step up and provide more support than ever.

"We're innovating to deliver more with less government funding, by decentralising our services, we can bring our neighbours the support they need – right on their own doorstep.

"Our new Engagement Hubs are about providing council services right in the heart of our communities where people need them most. Ilford Lane is a vibrant and buzzing community, providing the perfect location for our new Hub."

Since August 2022, Redbridge Council has directly supported more than 18,750 local people through the rising cost of living by providing:

- **2,500 awards** for energy, food and household essentials.
- 4,472 pensioners with energy support and advice.
- 800 single vulnerable adults with energy bills support and advice.
- 10,500 children with Free School Meals outside of term time.
- 100 households in crisis with financial support for energy and essentials.
- 400 local people with debt support.

The Hub will be open at least 40 hours a week, mainly during the working week.

However, it will also be open during some evenings and weekends to accommodate

the shift patterns of the Metropolitan Police and Safer Neighbourhood teams.



Upgraded Loxford Youth Centre officially opens

The new centre boasts a music studio, an outdoor gym, and a production kitchen.

In October, the Leader of Redbridge Council, Cllr Jas Athwal and Redbridge Mayor, Cllr Jyotsa Islam, officially opened the newly-renovated Constance Bridgeman Youth Centre in Loxford.

Following a complete refurbishment, the centre is now home to a music studio, classrooms, a multi-use games area, an outdoor gym, and a production kitchen.

As well as offering space and facilities for young people to use in the evenings, the centre is now an educational hub with classrooms in use by local students throughout the day. The centre will also be open at weekends soon.

By co-locating education provision and youth services in one space, the Council was able to create a brand new youth hub with education funding; a similar scheme is being considered for Wanstead Youth Centre. As part of plans to create a Loxford youth hub, Redbridge Council opened a new Sensory Playground for younger children earlier this year on the site of the Constance Bridgeman Youth Centre.



Redbridge Mayor, Cllr Jyotsna Islam, officially opened the new Youth Centre in October.

Cllr Lloyd Duddridge, Cabinet Member for Children, Young People and Education, said



"Every young person in Redbridge deserves access to quality education and youth services to give them the best possible start in life.

"We're innovating so we can deliver improved services despite losing 63 per cent of our government funding since 2010. By bringing education provision and youth services together in one building, we can upgrade our youth centres and make sure everyone in Redbridge has access to education."

Redbridge Institute, based in Gants Hill, enrols around 4,000 adult learners every year, and offered local resident, Pradeep Suthakar, a lifeline when she needed it most.

Newbury Park resident Pradeep Suthakar explains the enormous loss she felt after her dad passed away, bringing her own future into sharp focus.



"I just didn't know what to do, I was so lost. I eventually came to realise that if I wanted to widen my employment prospects, I would need more qualifications. I turned to Redbridge Institute for help." After speaking to staff at the Institute, Pradeep made the decision to enrol onto a Maths Level 2 course.

"Having returned to studying after 20 years away, I was naturally very nervous and anxious. I had no idea what to expect. When enrolment day came, I was pleasantly surprised, the staff were so friendly and helpful, and the institute was clearly well organised and efficiently run, I felt at ease straight away.

"I really regret not returning to education years ago. I love the energy at Redbridge Institute and wish I had enrolled years ago. Particularly as, prior to moving to Newbury Park, I had lived in Gants Hill, opposite the road that the Institute is on. I just couldn't be happier here."

Pradeep is looking forward to her next challenge, completing a Level 3 Teaching Assistant Diploma, with a view to working in schools.

Delivering affordable homes for local families

Programme remains on track to deliver 600 new homes by 2024.

The Affordable Homes Programme is part of Redbridge Council's commitment to providing high-quality, affordable council homes for local people.

We are building 600 new homes by 2024 on existing council-owned sites across the borough, supported by Greater London Authority grants.

Due to years of underbuilding and dwindling council house stock as a result of Right to Buy, Redbridge currently has among the lowest number of council houses in London. On average, a local family must wait 13 years for a property.

To help address this housing crisis, the Council is building a mixture of one, two, three and four-bedroom homes across Redbridge.

Now approaching its final year, the Affordable Homes programme remains on track to be delivered on time and within budget, despite significant challenges with the rising cost of building materials, and reductions in government funding.



Cllr Vanisha Solanki, Cabinet Member for Housing and Homelessness, said

"The current housing crisis has meant the Affordable Homes Programme is needed now more than ever. Building new properties will help to transform the lives of local families, providing somewhere they can call home."

The cold winter months can be dangerous for anyone who is sleeping rough. Redbridge Council is here to help.


Traditionally, Christmas is a time of celebration and festive cheer. However, for people sleeping rough, it can be particularly difficult as the nights get longer and colder.


Help is available for people sleeping rough, including:



Elections and voting

Want to have your say? Make sure you've registered to vote.

Q When is the next election?

A The next scheduled election is the Greater London Authority election, where the Mayor of London and London Assembly will be elected. This will take place on Thursday 2 May 2024.

Q When should I register to vote?

A You can register to vote at any time, but to be able to vote in an election, you must have registered at least 12 working days before polling day.

Q How can I register to vote?

A You can apply to register to vote easily online by visiting **www.gov.uk/register-to-vote** or by calling the Electoral Services office on **020 8708 7171**.

Please ensure you have your National Insurance number to hand.

Q I'd like to vote by post. How do I do that?

A If you want to vote by post, you can apply online by visiting **www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote**. Or, if you prefer, an application form can be posted to you. Please call the Electoral Services office on **020 8708 7171**.

If you're registered to vote by post, shortly before an election, you will receive a postal voting pack through the post, which will include your ballot paper. You will need to complete it at home and return it by post.

Q How do I find my polling station?

A Your poll card will give the address of your allocated polling station. You will not be able to vote at any other polling station.

You can also check your polling station, at https://wheredoivote.co.uk

Do I need to bring ID?

Yes. You must bring photo ID with you to be able to vote.

Forms of accepted photo ID include:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional licence)
- Blue Badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric Immigration Document
- · Defence identity card
- Certain national identity cards

Q If I do not have any accepted forms of photo ID, how do I vote?

A If you do not have any of the accepted photo ID documents, you will need to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate. This is a free photographic identification document specifically for the purposes of voting.

You can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate by visiting **www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate** or you can call the Electoral Services office on **020 8708 7171** and an application will be sent to you.

Q What can I do now to ensure I am ready to vote?

A It is a good idea to prepare well in advance of an election, so check the below steps and make sure you are ready to vote when the time comes:

- Register to vote if you are not yet on the electoral register, at your current address.
- Apply for a postal vote, if you would like one instead of visiting a polling station on polling day.
- Make sure you have accepted photo ID, or apply for a Voter Authority Certificate.

Are you looking after a child who is not your own?





- is the child under 16 (or 18 if they have a disability)?
- are you NOT the child's step parent, sibling, aunt, uncle or grandparent? This also includes host families to overseas students
- do you plan to have the child with you for more than 28 days?
- this is called 'private fostering' and we must be LEGALLY notified to ensure the child is safe

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A new round of Redbridge Go Green Grants launched in December 2023



- Your property will need to have an Energy Performance Certificate rating of D, E, F or G. If you do not currently have an EPC certificate registered to your property this will be completed for you at the time of survey.
- Household income of £30,000 or under.
 - Owner occupiers, landlords and tenants are eligible for funding. In the case of a rental property, the income eligibility applies to the existing tenant and not the landlord. The landlord must have an assured shorthold tenancy agreement in place with an existing tenant to be eligible for the grant.

Please note applications will be considered on a first come, first serve basis



The scheme can offer the following measures.

- **Cavity wall insulation**
- **Underfloor insulation**
- Loft insulation
- Solar panels
- **Heating and temperature controls**
- Hot water cylinders (replacement or insulation)
- Glazing

This is not an exhaustive list and will depend on the recommendations made by our surveyors.

If measures selected are above the maximum threshold of £4,500 the difference will need paid for in advance of the works commencing.
